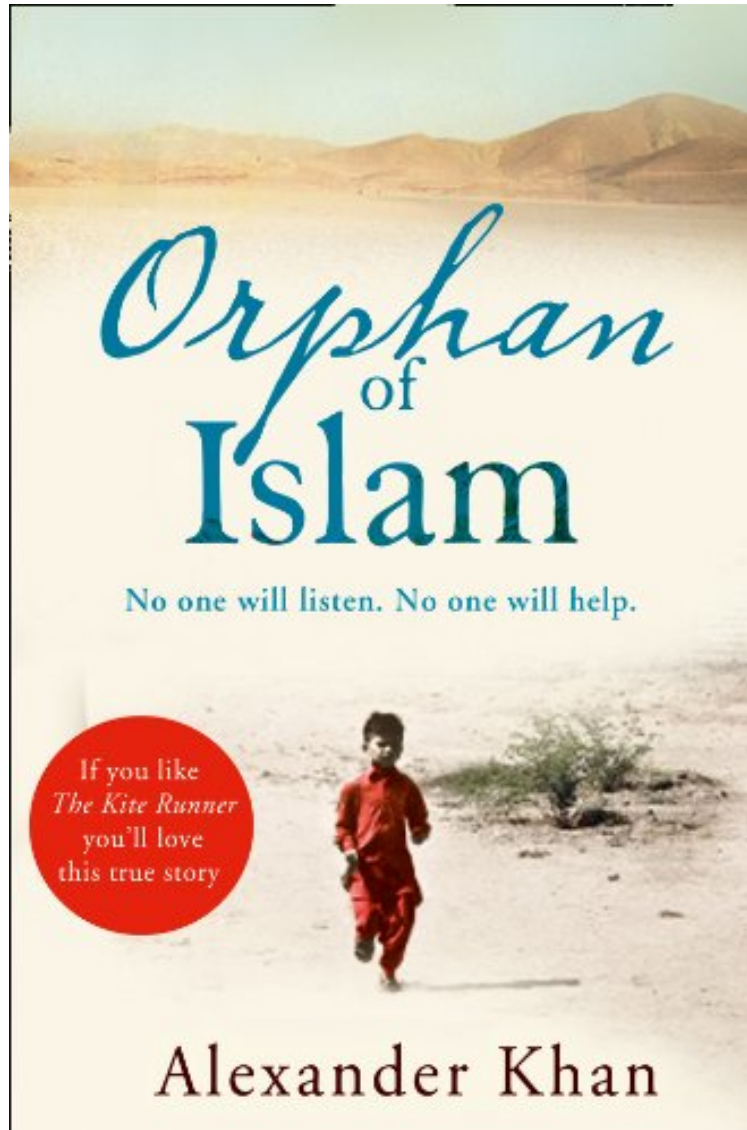

Von da an erlebt er Schreckliches, immer wieder und immer schlimmer. Auch in England, aber vor allem in Pakistan und Afghanistan. Entführung, Folter, Raub, Vergewaltigung, Missbrauch ... zuletzt wird er Zeuge eines Ehrenmords und darf nach England zurück, um nicht in die Hände der Polizei zu geraten. Mohammed (Alexander) Khan ist nie fr länger als ein paar Monate zur Schule gegangen, so dass man annehmen muss, dass er für dieses Buch einen Ghostwriter hatte. Leider bedient dieser sich einer ekelhaften Gassen- und Fkaliensprache, bei der man hinweglesen muss - sie passt zu der frchterlichen, von Armut, Gewalt und Lieblosigkeit geprägten Geschichte, die mir persönlich eines zu sagen hatte: Wenn nicht die hier beschriebene Religion selbst, dann die Gesellschaft, die diese Religion hervorgebracht hat, ist abgründig satanisch, böse, pervers, und das in jeder Hinsicht. Als Engländer muss ich mich auch abgründig schämen, dass solche Sachen in meinem Land geduldet, hingenommen wurden. Von "Integration" ist hier keine Spur, sondern nur vom gleichgültigen Laissez-faire, wie das auch 30 Jahre später in Deutschland vielfach der Fall ist. Da kann man nur hoffen, dass es den Menschen "mit Migrationshintergrund" besser geht als Mohammed Khan und dass man ihnen so schnell wie möglich hilft, ihren barbarischen asiatischen Hintergrund aufs deutlichste hinter sich zu lassen. Die Beschreibung der "Hasspredigten" in westlichen Moscheen lässt einem das Blut in den Adern gefrieren. Obwohl Alexander Khan wohl heute noch Moslem ist, kann man als Westeuropäer seine Botschaft nur so deuten: Wehrt euch mit allen Mitteln! Das Buch endet leider, nachdem Mohammed mit 16 Jahren nach England zurückkehrte. Es soll offensichtlich irgendwann ein Folgebild erscheinen, in dem erzählt wird, wie Mohammed bzw. Alexander aus dem Getto entkam, britischer Soldat wurde und in Afghanistan gegen seine Peiniger kämpfte.
