I work as a business/system analysts in large scale IT development projects and I have used a number of these techniques myself when trying to elicit requirements and/or lead to strategic decisions. To have a complete (or near complete) collection of all these diverse techniques in one book is just great. Furthermore, the authors do a really good job in making them understandable so as to be easily applicable to many situations: not just at work but also in private life. At the same time they also clearly point out that we should never confuse the model (or the map) with reality, or as the saying goes: a fool with a tool is still a fool. In other words as simple as they may seem used with a clear awareness of their limitations, these are really powerful tools in gaining an understanding about one's motivation, a situation at hand so as to make a decision.
